Specific topics will include photographic documentation for collaboration with colleagues and the laboratory, final impression techniques, provisionalization, material selection, digital dentistry applications, delivery and follow-up care of various real-world cases.

The 33rd Annual Dr. Peter Fedi Periodontics Lecture

The Use of the Periodontal Risk Score in Clinical **Practice: Benefits in Achieving Long-Term Periodontal** and Systemic Health for Our Patients



The Periodontal Risk Score (PRS) combines seven factors to provide a score that gives a patient a percentage of the likelihood they will keep their teeth for 15 and 30 years and not lose them to periodontal disease. As "physicians of the mouth," Dr. Robert Levine uses the PRS for all his patients and believes it significantly motivates patients to accept treatment and to take responsibility as an active participant/co-therapist in planning their treatment, resulting in the "achievement of their long-term periodontal and systemic health." Levine believes the PRS should be considered the standard of care.

Prosthetically-Driven Implant Site Development: A Periodontal Plastic Surgeon's Perspective

There are many surgical choices a clinician may have to discuss with their patients regarding the goal of Implant Site Development using the principles of Guided Bone Regeneration (GBR). The techniques and clinical situations can vary from straightforward, single tooth to complex (ITI SAC), multiple teeth, when there is lack of bone in either a horizontal, vertical or in both dimensions. Dr. Robert Levine will cover Implant Site Development techniques with well-documented cases with long-term CBCT follow-up. Levine will also discuss the importance of both analog and virtually planned/ fabricated surgical guide templates. Practice management "pearls" will be shared for improving case acceptance and how the "team approach" can make this process seamless, successful and personally rewarding.

Treatment of the Failed Maxillary Central Incisor Tooth: '10 Keys' for Providing Predictable Success and Happy Patients

This presentation will describe and identify 10 essential "keys" for performing immediate single tooth replacement of hopeless maxillary central incisor teeth. The "Updated 10 Keys Checklist" published in the Academy of Osseointegration News (2022) will provide high predictability in preventing esthetic complications and offers guidelines to ensure high success based on published studies by Dr. Robert Levine and his clinical research group. Patientreported outcomes and practice "pearls" will be shared to make this complex treatment a seamless experience for the whole team.

It can be highly discouraging when patients continue to have cavities despite improvements in their oral health. This can disrupt their oral health philosophy and create the belief that cavaties are normal for them. Dental hygienists have

the unique opportunity to identify each patient's specific risks and provide treatment recommendations accordingly. The best way to do this is through salivary pH testing, specifically because the pH of our patient's saliva plays a vital role in their oral cavity's hard and soft tissue health status.




